## **VISIT OF REPRESENTATIVES OF AN INTERNATIONAL COMPANY TO KHNMU**

On July 20th, representatives from the French company «Handicap International» visited the Kharkiv National Medical University. The international delegation included project manager Fiona Crook, rehabilitation technical officer Pasala Maneewong, and prosthetics technical officer Labkush Kumar. They were also joined by Maxim Haustov, the Director of the Department of Health Care of the Kharkiv Regional State Administration.



From the University's side, the event was attended by Rector Valeriy Kapustnik, members of the rectorate, directors of various departments, specialists, and staff from the University's 3D Technologies and International Relations departments.

During the meeting, the parties discussed possibilities for cooperation in the field of physical rehabilitation, prosthetics, and orthotics. Additionally, the delegation representatives were introduced to the work of the University, the 3D Technologies Center of the Educa-

tional and Research Institute for Quality of Education, Department of Traumatology and Orthopedics, and the Medical Rehabilitation Department of the University Clinic. They also learned about the training of specialists in therapy and rehabilitation.

Throughout the eventful visit, the delegation familiarized themselves with the capabilities of the 3D Technologies Center, its proprietary software developments, and the production of 3D models for both educational purposes and prosthetics. At the University Clinic, the company representatives discussed methods of patient prosthetics and rehabilitation, visited the Department of Orthopedics and Traumatology, and the Medical Rehabilitation Department, and had conversations with leading experts, among other activities.



On the other hand, the guests shared information about their organization's significant potential, extensive experience in prosthetics, and their goal of implementing a high standard of assistance in Ukraine. They also expressed their intention to contribute to the development of rehabilitation, offer training to students and specialists.

Furthermore, the parties discussed the preparation of specialists in physical therapy (rehabilitation) at KhNMU and summarized the outcomes of the visit.

# **MEETING WITH REPRESENTATIVES OF CHARITABLE FOUNDATIONS**



On July 21st, a meeting with representatives of «The Heracles Group» and «The Charitable Foundation of Yevhen Pivovarov» was held at Kharkiv National Medical University. The American company was represented by its president, Luke Calhoun.

From the University's side, the meeting was attended by representatives of the rectorate, department directors, staff from the 3D Technologies Center, and the International Relations Office. The main topic discussed during the event revolved around opportunities for collaboration in the field of prosthetics.

Luke Calhoun shared insights into the activities of his foundation, which has significant experience in establishing centers for 3D modeling and prosthetics in Syria and Yemen. Currently, they are interested in extending assistance to Ukraine and aim to create a relevant program within its territory. The program consists of several components, with one focused on teaching people to use 3D equipment for medical and general purposes, providing them with training programs in volving University and local specialists. Mr. Calhoun's main idea is to establish a technical base at the University, set up its operation, and then hand it over on a free-of-charge basis for further general use. The program is being developed and financed under the auspices of the United Nations.

During the visit, the guests were given a detailed overview of the work of the 3D Technologies Center at the Educational and Research Institute for Quality of Education, and they discussed further cooperation prospects in the field of prosthetics.

# REPRESENTATIVES OF KHNMU IS AN INSTRUCTORS IN AN INTERNATIONAL PROJECT

In January, a Memorandum of cooperation was signed between the Department of Health of the Kharkiv Regional Military Administration and the NGO «Mehad (ex-UOSSM France)».



The aim of the Memorandum is to promote interaction and coordination between the parties, focusing on conducting joint training in providing urgent and emergency medical assistance to Ukrainian citizens and other individuals within its territory, including during emergencies, disaster relief operations, and humanitarian support to those affected by armed aggression against Ukraine.

This project commenced on January 21st Instructors from the Department of Emergency Medicine, Anesthesiology, and Intensive Care of KhNMU, under the guidance of Medical Coordinator Yulia Volkova, conducted a two-day «Tactical Use of Ultrasound Course – TUSC-UA Course», which takes place weekly at the clinical base of

the Department at the Regional Clinical Specialized Dispensary for Radiation Protection of the Population.

The course's program is based on the experience of the developers of «Mehad (ex-UOSSM France)», gained over the last 10 years with the support of doctors and medical service providers in conflict zones and most humanitarian catastrophes in countries such as Iraq, Syria, Turkey, and Lebanon.

## REPRESENTATIVES OF KHNMU TOOK PART IN THE SIMS PROJECT

In May, the head of the Simulation Center, Maryna Dolzhenko, and the acting head of the International Relations Department, Maryna Bilonozhko, participated in a working meeting of the consortium partners at the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki (Greece).



The event took place as part of the implementation of the international project «Simulation medicine and Scenario-based learning for emergency care» (SimS) within the framework of Erasmus+.

During the first day of the working meeting, partners from the University of Santiago de Compostela conducted training on writing scenarios for emergency care, shared their experience of unexpected actions by students during scenario practice, and shared best practices in scenario development.

On the second day of the working meeting, consortium partners presented their universities. The Ukrainian partners discussed the challenges and opportunities of simulation training during the war, while European universities presented the work of simulation centers and expressed their support for Ukrainian universities in developing and implementing scenario-based learning. Partners were given a tour of the Clinical Skills Laboratory and other parts of the educational simulation campus. They also demonstrated the reception area, where human behavior is studied - there is an intelligent mirror that can tell your age, mood, job, and dominant hand.

During the third day of the working meeting, the training was conducted on scenario-based learning and the creation of scenarios on the educational digital platform for virtual scenarios, OpenLabyrinth. Colleagues from Aristotle University provided theoretical and practical training for using the OpenLabyrinth platform, and they shared

their experience of recording videos for medical students based on scenario-based learning.

In June, the second meeting of the Erasmus+ project consortium «Simulation medicine and scenario-based learning» (SimS) took place at the Lithuanian University of Health Sciences in the Republic of Lithuania. During the working meeting, from the consortium partners conducted on scenario-based training in HLab classrooms, practical stations, and simulation classrooms.



Colleagues from the Lithuanian University of Health Sciences gave a lecture on «Basic Principles of Adult Learning,» presented HLab teaching methodologies, and held discussions on topics such as the role of the HLab instructor in the educational process, skills assessment, skill stations evaluation, and creating a positive learning environment. These activities are part of the project's work plan approved by the European Commission. Additionally, representatives from KhNMU, along with other members of the delegation, took first place in the first aid competition among consortium partners.

Participation in this event facilitated further project implementation, exchange of experience and best practices between educators from higher and postgraduate education institutions in Lithuania, Greece, Spain, and Ukraine, and strengthened cooperation and networking.

Sincere thanks to our Greek colleagues from Aristotle University in Thessaloniki and the Lithuanian University of Health Sciences for organizing the event, providing support and incredible hospitality, and to all project partners for their fruitful work during the meeting. We are working together to improve medical education!

## STAFF MEMBERS OF KHNMU COMPLETED INTERNSHIP IN POLAND



The staff members of the Educational and Research Medical Center «University Clinic» at Kharkiv National Medical University, Psychiatrist, Professor Volodymyr Korostiy and Psychologist of the Medical Rehabilitation Department Oksana Zhelanova, completed an internship in the Republic of Poland for Ukrainian specialists in mental health and physical rehabilitation as part of an initiative by the First

Lady of Ukraine, Mrs. Olena Zelenska, and the First Lady of the Republic of Poland, Mrs. Agata Kornhauser-Duda.

The internship program included a detailed introduction to the work of the Psychiatry Clinic for Combat Stress and Psychotraumatology at the Military Institute of Medicine - National Research Institute in Warsaw. The training was conducted by experienced Polish specialists: clinical psychologist and group leader of the psychologists at the clinic, Michał Kuroń, and psychologist, certified in CPT and EMDR therapy. Paulina Szymanik.

Polish colleagues have many years of experience working with servicemen, veterans of various military missions, and actively assisting Ukrainian military psychologists and psychiatrists since 2014. The knowledge, skills, and advanced experience gained from the Combat Stress Clinic will be implemented in the practical activities of the Mental Health Center and the Medical Rehabilitation Department at the University Clinic of KhNMU, as well as in the educational process of the Department of Psychiatry, Narcology, Medical Psychology, and Social Work. Particularly valuable is the opportunity for scientific cooperation to adapt the new PTSD diagnostic methods to the modern conditions of Ukraine. Moreover, valuable contacts with colleagues from other regions of Ukraine are important for exchanging experiences. We hope for further fruitful cooperation with Ukrainian and Polish colleagues!

### PROFESSOR OF KHNMU GAVE A LECTURE IN VILNIUS



On 10 May the lecture «Professional Burnout in Health Care Workers» was given at the Faculty of Medicine of Vilnius University by Professor Igor Zavgorodnii from Kharkiv National Medical University (Ukraine). During the lecture, the professor introduced the phenomena of professional burnout or burnout syndrome and shared the findings of the joint research study that was implemented within the framework of a research agreement between Ukraine and Germany: cooperation between Kharkiv National

Medical University, Kharkiy National University of Radio Electronics. and Otto von Guericke University of Magdeburg (Germany).

According to the Professor, employee burnout statistics indicate that chronic stress at work often results in mental health problems, regardless of the job type. Referring to the World Health Organization, the professor excluded some characteristics from professional burn-

out: energy depletion or exhaustion, increased mental distance from one's job, and negativity or cynicism related to one's job.

Professor Zavgorodnji concluded his lecture by stating that the proposed methodological (mathematical) approach makes it possible to purposefully work with the group of pre-pathology persons. As he noted, the establishment of early diagnostic criteria for the prepathological states of professional burnout syndrome in healthcare professions should be considered a necessary stage in the development of preventive measures, namely the optimisation of the labour process and the availability of psychological assistance for employees.

The professor expressed his gratitude to the Faculty of Medicine of Vilnius University for the invitation to give a guest lecture, as well as to his colleagues from Kharkiv and Magdeburg; well as to his colleagues from Kharkiv and Magdeburg: Professor Valeriy Andriyovych Kapustnyk, Olena Leonidivna Litovchenko, Ph.D., assistant in the Department of Hygiene and Ecology No. 2 of Kharkiv National Medical University; M.D., professor; Irina Perova, Ph.D., from Kharkiv National University of Radio Electronics; and Professor Irina Böckelmann from the Department of Occupational Medicine at the Medical Faculty of the Otto von Guericke University of Magdeburg.

### MODERN INNOVATIONS IN THE EDUCATIONAL PROCESS



On May 11th, the Ukrainian-American company «KODA» handed over the state-of-the-art mobile 3D scanner Leo to Kharkiv National Medical University. This company is the sole representative of the European company 3D Artec (Luxembourg) in Ukraine, which develops modern 3D scanners and software for them. By the way, KhNMU is

the first higher education institution in Ukraine to receive this type of equipment.

During the meeting, the participants discussed the prospects of cooperation and the use of the 3D scanner in the educational process. Additionally, our University expressed the desire to join the project on prosthetics for military and civilian individuals using 3D technologies. This project is currently being implemented in Ukraine by 3D Artec. Considering this, Volodymyr Markovskiy, Vice-Rector for Researchand Education, emphasized the importance of supporting our military personnel who have suffered combat injuries or lost limbs on the frontlines, especially during wartime.

As part of the live demonstration, the Head of the service group from «KODA» showcased the operation of the 3D scanner Artec LEO, which is perfectly suited for rapidly obtaining accurate mathematical models of objects. The scanning process itself does not require placing markers on the surface of the object. Additionally, due to its high shooting speed and ability to capture information about surfaces with undercuts, the scanner has virtually unlimited capabilities.

We are sincerely grateful to our international partners for providing the most advanced technical support to KhNMU. Together to Victory!

### THE **«MUSIC MORNING BEATS»** EVENT FOR THE INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEER DAY

On December 5, the team of the community education and volunteering sector, together with the student council of the First Medical Faculty of the Student Government of KhNMU, visited the Kharkiv City Children's Clinical Hospital No. 16 in honor of the organization of the «Music morning beats» event, which was held on the occasion of the International Volunteer Day.



The world-famous composer and neuromusicologist Nigel Osborne was invited to this event. He is the author of the method of music therapy for children who survived the military conflict. The purpose of the event is to use musical art as psychological therapy. Professor Nigel Osborne pioneered methods of using music and art to support children who have been traumatized by war. This method was developed during the war in Bosnia and Herzegovina (1992–1995), and was later widely implemented in the Balkans, the Caucasus, the Middle East, East Africa, Southeast Asia, and India. For his methodology, Nigel was awarded the Freedom Prize of the Peace Institute in Sarajevo, in particular for his work with Bosnian children during the siege of the city.

Together with the children at the event, a number of compositions were created, symbolizing the indomitability of the children who survived hard times during the full-scale invasion. An example of one of the songs was a song called «Mriya» – an analogy to a Ukrainian plane. The children independently sang the melody, and the artist created a new song from the provided sound suggestions.

Also, at the event, all those present could familiarize themselves with the main symbol of Hibuki therapy – a toy that has the property of helping a child to get out of a state of psychological depression with the help of its correct use. Hibuki (hug dog) is a soft toy from Israel that helps our children survive traumatic events thanks to the hugs it simulates thanks to its special manufacture.

Volunteers of the KhNMU agreed with the administration and psychologists of the Kharkiv City Children's Clinical Hospital No. 16 regarding weekly visits to children and holding activities related to Hibuki therapy and other holidays.

# FOREIGN STUDENTS PASSED «KROK 2» EXAM AND ATTENDED A SEMINAR

In May, 32 foreign students from the 6th year of VI-VII faculties took the «KROK 2» integrated exam in Medicine in English. Some students arrived in Kharkiv from western regions of Ukraine, while others expressed their desire to take the exam abroad.



The next day, upon the initiative of the Department of Surgery No. 4, a practical seminar was organized and conducted for them at Clinical Hospital No. 5 on the topic of providing first aid for injuries in wartime conditions and basic skills of tactical medicine.

The seminar was attended by the Dean of the VII faculty for foreign students' training, Oksana Vasylieva, who welcomed all the attendees and thanked the students for their courage and determination to complete their education at KhNMU under the conditions of a military state in Ukraine, as evidenced by their choice to take the «KROK 2» exam in our city.

Professor Rostyslav Shevchenko reminded the students of certain theoretical aspects of providing first medical aid to the injured, citing anatomical and physiological justifications for applying assess-

ment techniques of patients' condition and using various methods of first aid. Special attention was given to methods of stopping external bleeding, immobilization of fractures, transportation immobilization, and aid for penetrating and non-penetrating gunshot wounds in different locations.

During the practical part of the seminar, Associate Professors Dmytro Priymenko and Ostap Brek demonstrated to the students the methods of providing first medical aid for traumatic injuries using standard and improvised means in wartime conditions: application of tourniquets to stop arterial and venous bleeding, transportation immobilization for fractures using splints, applying bandages to various parts of the body, and more.



The students had the opportunity to practice all the skills handson and gain valuable practical experience while being in Kharkiv during the final days of their studies at our University before taking the OSCE exam.
