INTRODUCTION

The syllabus of the discipline "Ethnography" is compiled in accordance with the educational professional program (hereinafter - EPP) "Dentistry" and the Standard of Higher Education of Ukraine (hereinafter - the Standard), the second (master's) level, field of knowledge 22 "Health care", specialization 221 "Dentistry"

Course description.

The total workload is 90 hours (3 credits). 10 hours are allocated for lectures, 10 hours for seminars, and 70 hours for independent study by the higher education student. The material is structured into 5 topics. Formation of a strong educational potential, achieving the highest quality of student's training is an important condition for development of modern society. Reforming higher education, the processes of European integration and globalization require health care professionals to take into account specifics of regions, their culture, religion, and worldview for using it in medical activities. Study of this discipline requires from students a creative approach for solving educational problems and the ability to determine their own trajectory of the educational process, which will allow to use teaching hours in the most efficient way.

The subject of study. The subject of the course "Ethnography" is the cultural and everyday life of peoples. Ethnography defines ethnic groups as very complex socio-biological intergenerational human communities that can exist as fully self-sufficient systems. The study of a composition of ethnic groups of Ukraine, their natural habitats, ethnosocial and ethnodemographic study of the population is an urgent task for training of modern specialists. The acquisition of knowledge in ethnography is an important part of their general professional medical education, which should contribute to a deeper understanding of aspects of the behavior of individuals, social groups and ethnic groups in work.

Interdisciplinary connections: The educational component "Ethnography" belongs to subjects with a very broad range of interdisciplinary links, as it lies at the intersection of such fields as medicine, social sciences, pedagogy, psychology, history, and art.

Prerequisites: Studying this educational component presupposes prior completion of subjects that provide basic knowledge about education, such as "History and Culture of Ukraine" and "Philosophy."

Postrequisites: "Ethnography" is integrated with the components that ensure the further training of higher education students.

1. The purpose and objectives of the course

1.1. The purpose of teaching the discipline "Ethnography" is to form appropriate to the current level of ethnographic ideas about the ethnic map of Ukraine, to acquaint students with the ethnographic features of the Ukrainian people, its customs, ethnopsychology and ethnopedagogy.

1.2. The main tasks of studying the discipline "Ethnography" are:

- education of respectful attitude of foreign students to Ukrainian culture and society on the basis of knowledge about cultural and everyday traditions and regional features of Ukraine;

- formation of basic knowledge about scientific approaches to the study of the peoples of the world and assessment of their contribution to world culture;

- formation of critical thinking, based on scientific achievements, conclusions that will be a reliable safeguard against xenophobia and chauvinistic statements and actions;

- mastering the skills of understanding national psychology and the formation of national consciousness based on knowledge about the contribution of peoples to world culture.

1.3. Competences and learning outcomes, the formation of which is facilitated by the discipline (relationship with the normative content of training of higher education, formulated in terms of learning outcomes in the EPP and Standard).

1.3.1. The study of the discipline provides students with the acquisition of competencies:

Teaching methods. During lectures and practical lessons it is recommended to use such pedagogical methods: problematic education, business games, «brain storm», work in groups, developing education, multilevel training (taking into account the abilities of different students), heuristic conversations, debates and discussions, preparing report-presentations, method of project training (preparing by student the independent research project), excursions to museums and exhibitions.

Methods of control (only those used in teaching the discipline are given):

Current control. During the current control methods of individual and face-to-face interviews, written testing, writing creative works (essays, reviews, reviews, own statements), microphone method, problem solving, work with sources and scientific literature, watching movies with further discussion are used, work in groups, verification tests.

Final control is carried out at the last lesson in the form of the final lesson, which includes control of all types of training provided by the curriculum. According to the results of educational activities, a test is set on a two-point scale "credited" - "not credited". A grade on a traditional scale is also given.

3. EVALUATION CRITERIA

3.1. Evaluation of the success of students' education is carried out on the basis of "Instructions for evaluating the educational activities of higher education students in KhNMU" (Table 2).

The maximum amount of points for the course is 200 points, the minimum acceptable for credit - 120 points.

3.2. Test questions:

1. Characterize methodological principles and methods of ethnographic research.
2. Identify the main tasks and functions of Ethnography.
3. Give a detailed description of research schools and directions in Ethnography.
4. Give characteristics of ethnic features of ancient Rus people.

5. Indicate features of the formation and development of the Ukrainian nation. Give examples of names of Ukraine and the Ukrainians.
6. Describe ethnic processes and interethnic relations in Ukraine.
7. Identify features of historical and ethnographic regions of Ukraine.
8. Name the subethnic and ethnographic groups of the Ukrainians.
9. Describe the ethnic composition of population of Ukraine.
10. Describe traditional tools, methods of soil processing and recycling of harvest by ethnic Ukrainians.
11. Characterize traditions of animal husbandry and cattle breeding in Ukrainian countryside.
12. Describe auxiliary occupations of the Ukrainian population: hunting, fishing, and beekeeping.
13. Describe decorative and applied arts of Ukrainian people.
14. Name types and forms of settlements in Ukraine.
15. Describe a folk architecture of rural residential complexes.
16. Describe Ukrainian traditional national dress and name regional differences.
17. Describe the system of food and cooking.
18. Describe traditional Ukrainian social forms of labour, communication, and leisure.
19. Identify special features of a Ukrainian family and marriage.
20. Explain traditional family customs and rituals.
21. Describe the worldview and beliefs of the Ukrainians.
22. Describe calendar and household rituals and stages of their formation.

3.3. Test questions for seminars

1. Traditional public communities. Social forms of labour, communication, and leisure.
2. Family and marriage. Family customs and rituals.
3. Folk knowledge, worldview and beliefs of the Ukrainians.
4. Calendar and household rituals: stages of formation.

4. DISCIPLINE POLICY

Discipline requirements

Written assignments and homework must be submitted in time. In case of questions students can contact the teacher personally or by e-mail which the teacher will provide in the first practical lesson.

During the lecture students are recommended to compose the lesson's summary and keep a sufficient level of silence. It is welcomed to pose the questions to a lecturer.

It is important to follow next rules:

- respect to colleagues;
- tolerance toward others and experience of people;
- receptivity and impartiality;
- ability to respect the person even in a case of disagreement with its thoughts;
- thorough reasoning of own opinion and courage to change it under the influence of counter arguments;
- self-expression when the person avoids the unnecessary generalizations, describes own feelings and forms expectations relying on own thoughts and emotions;
- obligatory work with the recommended sources of information.

The creative approach in its different forms is welcomed. In particular it is a participation in scientific conferences.

Attendance and behaviour

The students are expected to attend all lectures and practical lessons. In a case of skipping the class it is necessary to work off it according to the department's schedule.

Actions that are allowed during lessons:

- Leave the classroom for a short time in case of necessities and with a permission of teacher;
- To take a photos of presentations;
- To take active part in a course of the lesson.

Prohibited:

- Eating (except people whose special medical situation requires the opposite – in that case the medical confirmation is needed);
- Smoking, consuming of alcohol;
- Rude behaviour, expression of obscenities and offend someone's dignity;
- Gambling;
- To damage the university equipment;
- To make a noise or listen a music in classrooms or corridors during the lessons.

Using of electronic gadgets

Using of electronic gadgets during studying is allowed without restriction except those cases when it may interfere with the ways of objective assessment of students' knowledge.

Policy for people with the special educational needs

The studying is carried out taking into account the requirements of modern Ukrainian legislation in relation to persons with special educational needs and is regulated by the university.

Recommendations for successful mastering the discipline

In the process of preparation for practical classes students should study the recommended literature. Active participation during the discussion in the classroom is welcome, students should be ready to understand the material in detail, ask questions, express their point of view, discuss.

Incentives and penalties

According to the "Instructions for the evaluation of educational activities in the European credit-transfer system of the educational process in the KhNMU" students can increase the grade for the module by performing individual tasks (making the reports, participation in scientific conferences, competitions, preparation of reviews, etc.) in case of success gives 10 points as an incentive.

Safety precautions

The first lesson includes an explanation of the basic principles of labour protection. Every student should know the location of nearest evacuation exit, the fire extinguisher, how to use it, etc.

5. ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

One of the elements of academic culture that the university instills is the student's understanding of the inadmissibility of any borrowing without proper references. Given this, the main task of teachers is to form students' skills of independent work, interest in learning and socially significant values. The first sessions will provide information on what to consider plagiarism and how to properly conduct a research search.
